Reception

We have been really busy in Reception class this week with singing, maths, phonics and art amongst other things! Our new sounds have been t, n, i and p. We have also begun to practise reading 'red' (or tricky) words – these are high frequency words we see often in reading, on signs etc. and/or words that cannot be sounded out. We have looked at 'and', 'l', and 'to' so far.

In Maths we have continued looking at the value of single digit numbers and how to form them when we write - 8 was a fun but tricky one!

We are loving our Funky Fingers time in the afternoons when we really focus on fine motor skills to build strength and coordination in our hands ready for writing. We listen to music as we do this so it's a very relaxed, calm and focussed time of the day.

We have really enjoyed looking at faces, facial features and how faces change as we grow. We used mirrors to help us study our own faces for self-portraits. We hope you've enjoyed seeing them on our Evidence Me app!

Next week, we are thinking about the seasons and especially Autumn.










Year 1

The highlight of our week in Year 1 was our fantastic trip to How Hill! We had an amazing time, everyone behaved perfectly and we learnt a lot. We were mixed into groups with Year 2s and we did dyke dipping, environmental art and den building. All the activities were great fun. We then wrote about our trip when we were back in school and our writing was super!



Also, this week, we have recapped the sounds 'ar' (start the car) and 'or' (shut the door). We finished our work on Out and About – a First Book of Poems by planning and writing our own sensory Autumn poems.

In Maths, we have continued to learn about greater than, less than and equal to, using the symbols >, <, =. We looked at how we can order numbers on a number line and use that to help us work out if they are bigger or smaller.







Year 2

This week Year 1 and 2 enjoyed a fantastic day out at How Hill on Tuesday. The children enjoyed dyke dipping, den building and environmental art. They spotted squirrels dreys and rabbit burrows as well as catching a frog, a stickleback and lots of pond skaters and water beetles.

Back in school the children wrote sentences about their day using powerful verbs and adjectives. Today we began a new story book by Mini Grey called The Last Wolf.

In maths the children have compared and ordered numbers as well as counting backwards and forwards in 2s, 5s and 10s. We have revised the different ways of making the ay sound this week in phonics: ay (stay, may, play), ai (rain, Spain, grain) and a-e (make, cake, rake).

We looked at some of the environmental art that Andy Goldsworthy has created, stuck photographs of his work in our books and wrote sentences about them.









Year 3

This week in year 3, the children have been working incredibly hard on writing their own versions of 'The Comet'. They came up with new characters for their story, a new setting and an exciting new object for their character to see flying through the sky. They have been editing and improving their writing and as a reward for their brilliant work, were able to finish the week off by designing some wonderful pictures inspired by Joe Todd-Stanton.

In Maths, we have moved onto addition and subtraction. They children have been using base 10 to help them with adding and subtraction 1s, 10s and 100s from 3-digit numbers. Next week, we will continue with this topic but will be moving onto looking at adding and subtracting across 10s and 100s (for example, 256+8 and 546-9).


Our afternoons have continued to be filled with science. We have been looking at vertebrates and invertebrates this week and have been studying the five groups of vertebrates: mammals, fish, birds, reptiles and amphibians. It might be fun to test your child's knowledge by picking an animal and seeing if they can identify whether it is a vertebrate or invertebrate! Have a lovely weekend ©

Year 4

Year 4 have had another smashing week this week! In English, we have been looking at our writing our persuasive letters and we were so impressed by their writing. I know Mr Ashman is very excited to get his post and we are all looking forward to finishing the letters next week.

In Maths, we have begun our unit on addition with the class looking at using place value to support their understanding. Next week, we will be moving onto exchanging.

In topic, we have been creating our own classification grids with the children creating their own animals and questions to create their final piece.



Year 5

What a week! I've worked the children hard this week and they have not disappointed!

In maths, we have moved on to formal subtraction. We started with the place value counters to see what we are doing and why we are doing it, then moved on to showing it as a drawing, until finally today we used the formal column method. We still have a little work to do but they have been great!



In literacy, we have finally found the den of the Midnight Fox but we have also realised that it has been taking the hens from the farm so now Uncle

Fred wants to kill it. We have been planning and then writing our persuasive letters to Uncle Fred to try and convince him not to kill it.

In History, we have learnt about the reasons behind the start of WW2 and then begun to look at the evacuation of children – we tried to put ourselves in their shoes by thinking what we would take if we had been evacuated.

In Geography, we looked at maps of Rackheath to learn about its design. We then went on a walk around the village, stopping at 4 points to investigate what we can see and do a small traffic survey.



Year 6

It's been another very busy week in Year 6 and all of the children have risen to each challenge with a positive attitude! In Maths, we recapped column addition before moving on to tricky addition questions with missing digits. The children also continued to learn new tricks / short cuts to tackle arithmetic questions.

During our literacy lessons, the children learnt about coordinating conjunctions and how they can be used in sentences. See if they can tell you what the acronym 'FANBOYS' stands for. We also completed our detailed diary entries linked to Boy Overboard where the children were using vocabulary such as: melancholy, despondent, perilous, coarse, precarious, fatigued, frantic and weary to only name a few!

As part of Black History Month, the children had the opportunity to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture. In Topic, we researched the Battle of Britain in WW2 and learnt about the most affected cities in England. We began our French lessons too, where the class focused on numbers and had fun playing bingo to help them retain their pronunciations.
