
### Wellbeing tip from Mrs Cookson

The children have been busy in the 'Vets' role-play looking after the animals, building some lovely structures with the megablox and creating some lovely mark making on the screen and large whiteboard.


We will follow up fireworks next week and explore 'loose block' construction as well as going to the 'moon' and playing with our 'space' vehicles and aliens in our 'Space' station small world.

#### Reception

Welcome back all – we hope you had a fantastic half term break – we have loved seeing all our children again! We hope all the children enjoyed Halloween if this is something they participate in – we have given a gentle nod towards this festival this week by reading the classic Ahlberg story, 'Funnybones.' The children have enjoyed joining in with the repetitive language and getting to know the characters!

In phonics, we have learned I, h, sh and r. We're very impressed as the children tackled their first digraph 'sh' very well! We thought about words like: shop and ship. (Digraph: two letters making one sound). We also looked at the rhyming red words: he, me, we – I bet the children can spot the pattern there.

Maths has been lots of fun as we've explored using number lines – these are a great visual resource that we've used this week to help us count but also to think about finding 'one more'. The below number line also shows the superb 'Numicom' shapes resources that we use to give children a concrete/ tangible example of a number. The photo shows one of the **many** ways the children might use it in class.





We have really enjoyed meeting you all again at Parents Consultations and hope you found them useful – if there is anything you didn't get a chance to ask or want clarified, as always, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Don't forget – please could the children collect sticks for next week's learning. (Bring in Monday if possible). We need a variety: teeny, small, medium, big – maybe no more than around 10 each and none longer than 1 metre, please. Many thanks.

#### Year 1

In Year 1 this week, we finished our work on Little Red Riding Hood. We re-ordered pictures from the story and used these to tell the story to a friend. We then wrote letters, pretending to be the wolf, to say sorry to one of the other characters. We also coloured in pictures from the story, drew an alternative ending, and made Red words using magnetic letters.

In Phonics, we learnt the new sound 'ea' (cup of tea). We compared it to the sound 'ee' (what can you see?) that we already know. When we saw another way of writing the same sound we said, 'Same sound, different appearance!' We wrote words and sentences using both ways of making the ee sound. In Maths, we looked at addition and subtraction. We used part-whole models to find four matching number sentences, e.g. 4+2=6, 2+4=6, 6-2=4 and 6-4=2. We are loving playing on Sumdog at school!

We started our history topic this week by talking about things we know that are old! We then looked at toys, vehicles and technology from three different eras and looked at what has changed and what has stayed the same. We made posters to show how times have changed.

We had fun sketching a variety of pumpkins as the children were so excited about Halloween, and ended the week making sparkler pictures to celebrate Bonfire Night!

**Remember:** Monday is our Victorian Day so come to school dressed like a Victorian!



#### Year 2

This week has been another busy one with lots of learning and some pumpkin fun too!!

On Monday we listened to some of the story about Winnie the Witch and the enormous pumpkin. The children wrote their own endings to the story. The next day we read some pumpkin poems together and thought of interesting ways to describe pumpkins. The children wrote some fabulous poems which they will share in our class assembly next week. They also created wonderful pastel pictures of pumpkins. We have also finished the story of 'The Last Wolf' this week, and worked on the long o sound in phonics.

In maths we have focussed our learning on subtracting. The children have used bead strings, hundred squares and number lines to subtract a one-digit number from a two-digit number.

The children have also enjoyed learning about life in Victorian times and had PE with Mr Palmer.

On Monday we look forward to seeing everyone dressed up for our Victorian school day.

### Year 3

We have got straight back into the swing of things in year 3 and it has certainly felt like a busy week with Halloween; school council and eco-committee elections; parents evening and practising for our class assembly! In English, we started our fables unit of work, watching, listening and reading many fables, discussing what each of the characters learnt in the story and the moral that we can take away from it. We have also been having a go at punctuating direct speech, making sure the inverted commas, punctuation and reporting clauses are in the right place. The children have found this a little tricky, so any practise you can do with them at home will really help, including pointing out speech and talking about how it has been punctuated in their reading books.

We had some fun at the start of the week in maths with our Halloween themed place value activities but since then, have been practising subtraction using the new method. We are still getting to grips with this, so will continue to practise it the coming weeks to help consolidate the children's learning.

On Thursday, the children had a great PE lesson with Mr Ashman followed by a little bit of Geography, studying the countries that make up the United Kingdom. We have also been practising for our class assembly and cannot wait to show the grown-ups what we have been getting up to next week. Have a lovely weekend, Miss H <sup>©</sup>

### Year 4

Year 4 have started the term off brilliantly! We have started a new unit of English which is all about Greek Myths. So far, we have explored the story of Pandora's box which the children loved. Today, we have been re-telling the story of Icarus and the children have been story tellers which was great fun!


In Maths, we have finally mastered our method for subtraction and the class are feeling very proud of themselves. Next week, we will be beginning to explore multiplication and we will be looking at our times tables in more detail.

In Topic, we started to look at the local geography around us by creating sketch maps and also looking at creating keys. On Monday, we will be completing a local walk of Rackheath and we are still looking for helpers! If anyone is able to help out, please let us know. Children will need to make sure they have a coat with them please.

Lastly, swimming on Thursday 9<sup>th</sup> November has been cancelled due to the pool having some maintenance work done. Please could the children bring their PE kits in instead. Swimming will resume as normal on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> until the end of term.

# Year 5

What a week it has been! In English, we have moved on to our new unit of work based on the book 'How Cats Really Work' by Alan Snow. For this unit of work, we will be writing explanation texts linked to my pet rabbits and imagining that they are really just robots controlled by smaller robots – the children are all very excited!



In maths, we are moving on to large multiplication through partitioning – the most important skill for this is times table knowledge so any work you can do at home to help will be really helpful.

In science, we have looked at the work of Carl Linnaeus and how he developed a method of classifying animals. For 8 billion ideas, the children have developed a final design and are now ready to make. They may start asking for recyclable materials that can be used.

The most exciting part of our week was our trip to Gressenhall to learn about WW2. As you can see from the pictures, the children had a fantastic time and learnt lots! They also looked fantastic – a big thank you for that. On the day we learnt about the Homeguard by practising some drills, rationing by making mashed potato truffles and about the land army by helping out on the farm. It really was brilliant, and the children were really well behaved!







#### Year 6

It's been a fantastic first week back where all of the children have continued to work hard. In Maths lessons, we have concluded our multiplication topic with a series of reasoning and worded problems. The Year 6s then moved on to using short division where they were able to tackle some very tricky questions!

In Literacy, the children were given a copy of the 'Jabberwocky' poem by Lewis Carroll. It was fantastic to see them deconstruct the poem and give their opinions on what it is about – even though a lot of the words are made up! They then produced an illustration of what they thought the Jabberwocky would look like and then used their grammar knowledge to highlight the nouns, adjectives and verbs of the nonsense words.

In Science, we learnt about classification keys and the children began creating their own examples from scratch. A large part of our history learning linked to the Gressenhall trip on Wednesday. Not only did the children behave well and demonstrate a fantastic understanding, but they also got to participate in a variety of fun activities linked to WW2. Yesterday, we were lucky enough to have a visitor from EVERFI who ran a workshop with the Year 6s linked to sustainability.

Please remember that the children will need to bring a packed lunch to school with them on Monday as well as everything else on the Aylmerton kit list. I'm sure the children are going to have an amazing time and I'd like to also say a massive thank you to Mrs Roe, Mrs Goddard and Mr Cavender who are giving up their time away from their families to join us on this year's residential.
