Wellbeing tip from Mrs Cookson

This week, I've been blowing the dust off my GCSE biology knowledge and finding out more about the vagus nerve! The vagus nerve helps us to feel emotionally balanced and it runs from the brain, through the face and thorax and into the abdomen. When we sing, hum, or gargle it activates the vagus nerve which sends a



message to our brain that we're safe and all is well. If you do one of these when you're feeling emotionally triggered it can help you to feel more relaxed and at ease. Personally, I prefer the singing or humming option - this works especially well if you choose a short, repetitive tune with words which make you feel good.

Reception

We're at the end of another busy week in reception class – thank you to all who were able to make it to our class assembly – the children did really well, it's not easy to stand up and 'perform' in front of so many when you haven't been at school long and you're only 4 or 5. In phonics, we have been busy learning th, z, ch and qu. Our red words are: **you** and **your**. Please keep practising at home – we can see some of you have been doing this lots and it makes such a difference – thank you! We would love to win Reading Bear again soon.

We have loved joining in with World Nursery Rhyme week. We have enjoyed singing and moving to Jack and Jill, Hickory Dickory Dock, Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes and Row, Row, Row Your Boat. We even heard what Heads, Shoulders sounds like in French! The children loved lots of learning linked to these – for example, we investigated all sorts of boats (canoes, sail boats, rowing boats, etc) and even junk modelled our own boats – some of us made super submarines!

We loved the 'Children in Need' fundraising races (or some of us chose to watch) and we enjoyed making Pudsey collages too! (Thank you for being so very generous).

Have a great weekend - we are looking forward to next week when we'll be exploring playground games and activities to help us think about keeping ourselves happy and safe when playing with our friends.



Year 1

In Year 1 this week, we had our Class Assembly! We are so proud of all the children for how hard they worked on making their performance amazing – we hope you enjoyed it and thanks for coming.

In Phonics, we learnt the new sound 'a-e' (make a cake) and compared it to 'ay' (may I play). This sound is called a split digraph and we call it 'split e' when sounding out to write it. In English, we continued with Beegu. We drew speech bubbles for what Beegu and her family might be saying to each other if we could understand their language. We wrote postcards from Beegu to the children on Earth. We also made Play do space items, did alien colouring and looked for more clues for where Beegu had gone.

In Maths, we have been looking at subtraction again. We counted back along number lines to solve problems, 'took away' toys and counted backwards. We recorded our work pictorially and by writing the number sentence.

In History, we continued our Great Fire of London topic by looking at pictures showing why the fire spread quickly. For example, houses were tightly packed, it was windy, there was no fire brigade etc. We are starting to make our own Great Fire of London houses.

We also started to learn the songs for this year's Christmas Production!

Year 2

This week began with a fabulous Pantomime performance of Snow White which the children really enjoyed.

This came at just the right time as we have begun reading an unusual version of Rapunzel and also sharing lots of other traditional stories. In our English lessons the children have been making predictions about what might happen in the story and writing sentences about both the witch and Rapunzel. Today we also watched two different versions of the story of Babushka which is the Russian folktale which our Christmas performance will be based on.

The children have been told which parts they are going to be. Next week we will send scripts home for those who have lines to learn and late notes about any costume items which we would like you to provide. We would really appreciate your support with this.

In maths the children have been using equipment to add two 2-digit numbers together before moving on to record using an informal method. We have also practised counting in tens forwards and backwards from any number.

The children have begun learning about London in the 17th Century finding out about transport, buildings and they types of jobs which people did. Next week they will start to learn about the Great Fire of London.

Year 3

In English this week, we have been looking at play scripts. We had some fun at the beginning of the week, acting out Jack and the Beanstalk and George's Marvellous Medicine before going on to study them in a bit more detail by finding and highlighting the features of a play script. Next week, we will be continuing studying play scripts and have a go at writing some of our own based on the fable stories we have been learning about.






In maths, the children have really impressed me with how quickly they

have been able to pick up the grid method to multiply a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number. We started by drawing out the 10s and 1s to help us, before using our knowledge of times tables to help us work them out quicker. We then had a go at some worded problems and missing number problems. Take a look at some examples of the children's brilliant work...

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In the afternoons, we have been continuing with our Geography work, locating countries in Europe. We also had some fun in our computing lesson on Wednesday, designing a Christmas card which will be entered into the Purple Mash Festive card competition at the end of the month. I have also created a 2Do for the children to have a go at this at home if they would like to.

Year 4

Year 4 have had such a busy week; Monday feels like ages ago!

We've squeezed so much in. Somehow, we've managed to have the majority of the class smash through a new times table certificate. Next week, we will be starting to look at the dreaded 7 times table!

In English, we've been looking at fronted adverbials and we've learnt the story of The Trojan Horse. Next week, we'll be moving onto paragraphs before we start to plan our own myths.

In Topic, the children have been comparing how land is used in different types of settlements by creating their own cities, villages, towns or seaside towns. We've also completed our local maps of Rackheath too!

Just a note to say that unfortunately swimming has had to be cancelled again next week. We are hoping it will return on the 30th November. Children will need their PE kits on Thursday instead.

Year 5

What a week! It has been nonstop in year 5 and I'm rather glad it is now the weekend.

On Tuesday, we had our 8-Billion Ideas making day, where the children finally had the opportunity to bring their amazing ideas to life with a prototype model! This meant lots of mess, cardboard, and gluing. Once all of the prototypes were made, the children



then made posters, jingles and a script to allow them to present their work on Friday. We had a member of the Lion's team come in and helped us to judge to find the winning team who will now have their work sent through to the national final which will take place in December. The winning idea came from Connor, Ellie and Jacob who came up with The Bee Box – a box that can be bought from a shop, set up on a window sill and will provide a small ecosystem for bees to thrive! A massive well done to all of the children as they were all creative and really wowed us!

Then, on Tuesday, we had our WW2 Evacuee Day. The children used clay to make WW2 medals, after learning

about their differences and reasons. They used water colours to create a Blitz scene and then we briefly looked at the B24 bomber (which was stationed in Rackheath). We were





also lucky enough to have a WW2 inspired meal of stew and dumplings, cooked by Shane and Abi in the kitchen (and the children absolutely loved it!). But the real treat of the day was to be visited by Brenda, who lived in Norfolk during WW2. She talked to us about her life then, about rationing and about not being able to understand the land girls who came from Yorkshire. The highlight has to be the stories about the rabbits her family kept! Ask your child to find out more. Brenda also brought in several different resources from us to look at such as a rationing book and a school photo. This was a truly amazing experience and something I am grateful that we could have. Thank you to all who made that day amazing!







Year 6

This week has absolutely flown by, yet we've managed to (somehow) fit in so many activities! Similar to in last week's paragraph, I'd like to mention again how brilliant the class were at Aylmerton. It made me so proud to hear the numerous compliments from the instructors about how well behaved and supportive they were.

In Maths lessons, we concluded our division topic and ended by looking at some challenging two-step word problems. As always, the children persevered and demonstrated a good understanding. When then moved on to multiplying and dividing decimal numbers by 10,100 and 1000.





In English activities, we continued our Jabberwocky nonsense poems and then planned a recount text which is either linked to Aylmerton or Gressenhall.

Wednesday was our WW2 Evacuee Day where the children got to dress up as an evacuee, produce a piece of 'Blitz' artwork, make a WW2 inspired medal out of clay, design the contents of a suitcase, learn about the B24 Liberator and compare Rackheath during WW2.

In other afternoon lessons, the children completed a French activity linked to the months of the year and continued our germination projection in science. Please note that it is our class assembly next Tuesday at 2:40pm and a lot of this is linked to Aylmerton and Gressenhall.
