Reception

It's been an exciting and musical time this week in reception class as we've started to rehearse our nativity!

We have been busy learning lots of new sounds: 'x' and the digraphs: 'ng', 'nk' and 'ck'. This has been interesting as we usually look at the sounds at the beginning of words when we introduce a new sound so we had to think hard about where the sounds were in this week's words, such as 'ring' and 'duck'. Well done, Reception class. Our tricky red words are: so, no and go. The children did the best reading of them today that I've seen so far – keep it up!

In maths, we've been working on finding one less – we've used objects to count and then take away to find one less and also moved backwards on a number line.

Year 1

In Year 1 this week, we made 17th Century houses like those that burned in the Great Fire of London. We used cereal boxes and we cut and glued paper in different colours to make wooden beams, doors and rooves. We acted out the different methods people used to try to fight the fire, looked at who was at fault for the fire, and thought about the problems (and solutions) people faced after the fire.

In Phonics, we have learnt the new sound 'i-e' (nice smile), another 'split e'! We compared it to the sound 'igh' (fly high) that we already know. In English, we finished our Beegu work. We drew storyboards of pictures of the whole story, then wrote the story in our own words. My goodness – they did so much writing! Well done Year 1. We also made a Guide to Planet Earth to send to Beegu to show her the wonderful things about our planet.

In Maths, we moved on to subtracting by using a number line to count back. The children were fantastic at this! We have answered lots of questions, including some children moving on to much bigger numbers! We also worked out the answers to some subtraction word problems.

We all know our parts in the Christmas Production 'Babushka' now, and we are starting to learn the songs. We will provide most of the costumes but will send home a message soon about any little bits we may need your child to bring in.









Year 2

This week the whole class are stars for struggling on despite the fact that most of them have been poorly with coughs, colds, headaches and/or tummy aches. Hopefully, after the weekend everyone will be returned to full health

In maths this week the children have worked hard using tens frames to add numbers. We have nearly finished the Rapunzel story in English. The children have thought of ideas for defeating witches and written sentences about Rapunzel and the witch using powerful verbs and adverbs.


In history the children have been detectives finding clues as to how the Fire of London started. The have also been comparing the St Paul's Cathedral which burnt down in the fire with the one designed by Sir Christopher Wren and built after the fire.

The great excitement of the week for the children has been finding out their parts in our Christmas Production. We have loved singing the songs and reading through the script. If your child has brought a script home, please help them to practice reading it. The Narrators do not need to know their parts off by heart but the others will.

Year 3

This week in English, we have been writing fables in the style of a play script. On Monday, we practised writing the first scene from 'The Boy Who Cried Wolf' all together as a class, before going on to write 'The Ant and the Grasshopper' independently. The children picked it up brilliantly and some even started to add stage directions!

In maths, we have been moving onto division. We have learnt two methods: dividing by chunking and dividing by grouping. On Wednesday, I then let the children decide which method they preferred before going on to have a go at some division questions involving remainders. Once again, the children have really impressed me with how well they were able to get to grips with these methods. I have included some pictures to show you how we did it, should you wish to have a go with your children at home...





Following this, we went on a local walk as part of our Geography topic yesterday and have spent the afternoon today creating our own maps of Rackheath, complete with a

key and symbols.

I also shared the news with the class this week, that I would be leaving at the end of the term and whilst this will be sad, I have no doubt that Miss Holding will be a fantastic teacher and that the children will get on brilliantly with her.

Year 4

Year 4 have had another amazing week - it's been a busy one!

We have started our new part of our topic which is all about local windmills and how they were used in the past. The children have been identifying how they know something is old and have begun to consider what farming was like in the past.

In English, we have been looking at paragraphs and writing our own versions of the story of The Trojan Horse. Next week, we will be planning our own myths!

In maths this week, we have been exploring the 7x table - which the children will tell you is my mathematical archnemesis! They have enjoyed looking for patterns and using their counting to multiple knowledge to multiply numbers in the 10s and hundreds.

We have been told that the pool should be open next week for swimming but this is being confirmed on Monday so we will let you know!

Year 5

After the busy week of 8 Billion Ideas and WW2 day we last week, we have managed to calm down a little!

In maths, we have finished our work on multiplication and division by looking at worded problems. We have now started our work on fractions by looking at equivalent fractions using a bar to show how different fractions can still be the same amount e.g.

In English, we have continued our Explanation unit by writing the paragraphs for the stages of a Binky – this is a big jump that rabbits sometimes do. Our main focus has been on using sentences containing brackets, dashes and semicolons.

During our afternoons, we spent some time preparing for our class assembly. We also looked at what a battery (or a cell) is made from and how it works. Next week we will be making Anderson shelters as part of our history unit and interactive quiz using circuits. For these we need as many cereal boxes as possible.

Year 6

What a super week it has been in Year 6! I want to start by saying how brilliantly the class performed in their class assembly on Tuesday. The children very much enjoyed sharing their favourite memories from Aylmerton, Gressenhall and our WW2 Evacuee Day. It was great that so many parents and family members were able to attend.

In Maths lessons this week, we completed our unit of work linked to multiplying and dividing decimal numbers by 10, 100 and 1000. Fractions has become our new area of focus and the class started this by finding fractions of shapes and objects. Towards the end of the week, they were confident in being able to quickly find fractions of numbers too.

In Literacy, the children began writing their recounts – which were either linked to Aylmerton or Gressenhall. In addition to this, they completed a series of grammar challenges and it was fantastic to see how much they were able to retain.

In Science, we discussed (and researched) the importance of Carl Linnaeus and I introduced our new topic - Electricity. This is one of my favourite Science topics and I know the children are really looking forward to building their own circuits! In History lessons, we continued our work from the WW2 Evacuee Day, where we created our own B24 Liberator designs. In French lessons, the children learnt the months of the year and moved onto weather conditions.
