
Christmas Post Boxes

Wellbeing tip from Mrs Cookson

Research has found that when participants kept track of their own kind behaviour towards other people, and counted the number of kind acts they did each day for a week, they reported feeling happier compared with another group of people who didn't track their kindness. This suggests that being kind, (and recognising when you are acting kind)



may increase your happiness. The kind behaviour can be towards friends, family, strangers, and even yourself. One of my favourite ways of being kind to a stranger is to buy an extra coffee when I'm treating myself to one. I ask the barista to give the coffee to someone they serve later that day. I've been told that one of the strangers who received one of my coffees then immediately 'paid it forward' by buying a coffee for another stranger. I think this goes to show that a simple act of kindness can ripple out further than we imagine. Year 1

This week in Year 1 we started to rehearse for our Christmas Performance! The children have all been amazing so we are looking forward to performing for you!

We have been looking at the names of 3D shapes in Maths this week. We made models using the shapes and sorted them into groups. We looked at the names of their 2D faces.

In Phonics, we learnt the new sound 'o-e' (phone home) and compared it to 'ow' (blow the snow). In English and RE, we looked at how Christians celebrate Christmas. We also looked at the Nativity story. We put pictures of the story in order, acted it out and started to write our own version of the story.

We talked about the ways in which we are all different including differences in our skin colour. We also looked at the ways in which our families are different – some have two mummies, some have one daddy and no mummy, some are the only child in their house.

We had fun making cheeky elf decorations for the Christmas tree in the hall!

Next week we will continue with writing the Christmas story and investigating 2D & 3D shape. We will have a daily rehearsal for our Christmas play, some Christmas maths activities, PE as normal and library time on Monday afternoon so children can change their books.





Year 2

Year 2 have had another busy week with rehearsals every day in the hall. The children have just amazed us with how quickly they have learnt when they go on to the stage and when it is their turn to speak. They are singing beautifully and the narrators have obviously been practising their lines at home. I think you are all in for a real treat when it is time for the performances!

In addition to rehearsing, we have had guided reading every day, revised words with the ir sound spelt ir, er and ur and completed some writing about our Rapunzel story. The children have also completed maths assessment booklets. We were most impressed with how well they applied themselves to having a go at every question.

The children also enjoyed a PE lesson with Mr Palmer, learnt about why the Fire of London spread so quickly and made a decoration for the school tree.

Next week we will rehearse in the hall every morning and also on Monday afternoon. We will also have guided reading every day. On Tuesday afternoon the children will have PE as usual with Mr Palmer. On Wednesday and Thursday afternoons the children will learn about Diwali with Miss Knight. On Monday the children will have their spelling test. This will be the last one for this term. I am not here on Monday morning but should be back in at lunchtime. In the morning, Mrs Crook and Miss Knight will be looking after the children.

Year 3

It has been a bit of a funny week in year 3 as the children started the week being taught by Miss Maibaum, who used to teach at the school. They did some wonderful work and I was really impressed with their knowledge of when to use 'a' and 'an'. The rest of the week then consisted of maths and reading assessments, which surprisingly, most of the children actually enjoyed doing! It was a chance for them to show off all of their brilliant maths and reading knowledge and I have been so pleased with their ability to sit quietly, get their heads down and have a go at questions even if they were unsure of them. We have also had some fun creating our Christmas tree decorations for the school hall and finished the afternoon today with a lovely hour with year 4, doing some Christmas French work followed by some fun Christmas activities ©

This morning, we presented some of the class with the first reading certificates of the year. Congratulations to all of the children who have read x3 a week for 10 weeks and received their Bronze certificates.

There will be a few changes to our usual timetable over the next few weeks in the build up to Christmas. On Wednesday afternoons, we will be practising singing for the Christmas carol concert and next Friday we will be doing our 'Presentations of Learning'. The children will also be having a chance to meet their new teacher Miss Holding in the next couple of weeks, which I am sure they will love.



Year 4

Year 4 have had another amazing week this week!

In Maths this week, we have been looking at multiplying 3-digit numbers by 2-digit numbers. The class have done such a great job and we will be moving onto the grid method next week.

In English, we have been planning our own Greek myths which the children have loved.

In topic, we have been looking at the history of our school! We have looked at the old school in photos and looked at old maps of Rackheath where the road near the Sole and Heel was called Slipper's Bottom!

Our time table next week:

Our morning will be generally the same all week. On Tuesday afternoon, we will be starting our 'Presentation of Learning project' where the children will work in small groups to create a presentation about a part of learning from this term which we will be sharing with Year 5 on Friday morning. On Wednesday afternoon we will be practising our singing in the hall with the band. Swimming is on, on Thursday and Mrs Cavender will in class as usual.

Year 5

Another busy week in year 5 – and a cold one too!

In maths, we have continued our work on fractions. We have looked at equivalent fractions (e.g. 3/5 = 9/15) and then we have moved onto working out fractions of amounts (e.g. what is 2/5 of £15). We will be continuing with this next week as we prepare for the Christmas sales!

In English, we have put all of our work around how a rabbit will binky and we have created a non-fiction page. As you can see from the pictures, they look amazing!

The highlight of the week has to be our Anderson Shelters that we made as part of our WW2 unit. The children used shoe boxes to show a garden on top, and then they built how it would look on the inside of the shelter. I can safely say that the children absolutely loved this little DT project as they were all so focussed and hard working for the entire day!

Next week, we will have a slight change to timetable as on Weds and Thurs we will be rehearsing along with all of KS2 for the Carol Concert the following week.




Year 6

Yet again, the children have worked incredibly hard in lessons and should be proud of the work they've produced. In Maths activities, we continued our unit of work linked to fractions. This included learning what improper fractions and mixed numbers are – and how to convert between the two. We then moved on to understanding equivalent fractions and how to show them in their simplest form.

During Literacy lessons, the children started their new topic of newspaper report writing. After discussing (and highlighting) the key features of a newspaper report, the Year 6s began planning their own... but with a bit of a twist! This linked to Humpty Dumpty being *pushed* off the King's wall! Within their plans, the class had to think about potential witnesses, reported and direct speech, key vocabulary and updates on Humpty's recovery. I can't wait for them to be written next week as I know they will be so creative! We also managed to fit in a grammar challenge linked to semi-colons.

In Science, we continued our electricity topic including the difference between electrons and protons. During our Geography lessons, we learnt about the 8 compass points and OS maps including their symbols. In French, the children began learning the names for a variety of pets. Everyone was also very excited to create decorations for the Christmas tree in the school hall!





We hope you all enjoyed attending the lovely festive Christmas Fayre today organised by our amazing FORS committee.

Two of our staff have been very busy over the last couple of days! Ms Holmes and Mrs Goddard baked 680 fairy cakes, 240 biscuits and 100 chocolate rice crispy cakes!
