Wellbeing with Mrs Cookson

To help promote a positive experience of the holidays for all members of your family, I'd like to share the 'do-over'. When it comes to resolving disputes with our children it can feel like we're trying to untangle a knotted ball of wool while wearing mittens! Our well-meaning efforts to find out exactly what happened, so we can provide a fair solution or consequence, can make the situation feel worse for



all involved. One of my favourite ways to handle this kind of situation is the 'do-over'. This works well when it's a minor issue or niggle and all it needs is a simple set up in advance. How does this work in practice? When the time is right, (i.e., not mid-argument) explain to your child that there might be times in the future that you'll ask them, (calmly) to 'do-over'. When they're asked to 'do-over' they'll need to repeat what they've just said or done but using a more thoughtful choice of words, a kinder tone of voice, and friendlier body language. In a nutshell, the 'do-over' allows your child to get things back on track without you having to lecture them and it highlights the importance of all family members talking to each other with respect. The 'do-over' works well with all age groups and we can even announce our own 'do-over' when we're in need of a no blame opportunity for a fresh start. If you choose to give this a whirl, I'd love to hear how the 'do-over' works for your family.

The children had red 'hearts' to decorate on Wednesday and discussed 'Valentines' Day. It has been lovely that some children are enjoying making pictures for their friends. We will be looking at the letter 'M' on return from half term and having 'movement' as our 'circle' theme. We will be exploring lots of different painting activities and playing a variety pf PSE game each day as our focus. We will be holding our 'stay and play' week 4th – 8th March if any parents / grandparents would like to come in a bit earlier prior to collection to have a look at their children's learning stories and have a play.





Reception

We are half way through the school year! The time in reception class seems to be flying by and it has been wonderful getting to know your children and seeing them grow, develop and learn. We have seen each and every child progress and it has been a privilege to see them take pride in their achievements!

This week, we have been looking at celebrations – Pancake Day and Valentines – the latter being a great opportunity for children to think about how we can be kind to one another. We have read two beautiful books – The Invisible String which is a brilliant way to help your children learn that, though they may not be physically with you, such as whilst they're at school or if you had to work away, love always connects you (the 'invisible string'). We also read a gorgeous story about 'feelings' (In My Heart, Jo Witek) which was a great prompt to help the children think about how they behave when they experience different emotions. We'd highly recommend both books.

In phonics, we have learned the 'oo' sound, as in 'look' and 'book'. Our red words are: **who, two** and **very.** Maths has been lots of fun as we've explored measuring and words like distance, length, height, taller, shorter, longer, wider.

We hope you all have a wonderful half term – whilst we will be continuing our Ocean topic after the break, it will take an exciting turn ... eye patches and telescopes at the ready!







Year 1

We have had a lovely week to end the half term. We all used the laptops on Monday to paint a picture of a penguin on Purple Mash. With some help, they all managed to log in and get onto the correct program and to save their finished work. The penguins looked fab! We then moved onto our history unit about famous people. We learned about Lord Nelson and made our own Nelson's Columns using Lego, Duplo and wooden or foam blocks! We found out about Christopher Columbus and wrote our own messages in a bottle. We finished our Sun, Sea and Song music work.

We loved the Marine Biologists visit on Wednesday. It was really interesting to find out about the chalk reef at Cromer and to learn more about seals and wind turbines! We drew brilliant pictures of our favourite things from the presentation.

In Maths, we looked at place value of numbers to 50 and beyond. We practised drawing and writing how many tens and ones are in 2-digit numbers, and used Dienes tens and ones to help us. Some of us could even do 3-digit numbers! We put the numbers in order.

In Phonics, we learnt the new sound 'oa' (goat in a boat) and compared it to 'ow' (blow the snow) and 'o-e' (phone home). In English, we continued our work on poetry and Michael Rosen. We looked at onomatopoeia and rhyming words. We listened to the poem 'Oh Dear!' and wrote our own versions of it.







Year 2

Year 2 have had another fabulous week enjoying their learning, but are definitely ready for the Half Term break!

The children have particularly enjoyed lots of art work, especially creating their ocean in a box which they should all have brought home. On Monday afternoon they mixed the shades of blue which they wanted in order to paint their box, and then yesterday afternoon they created the creatures, plants, divers and shipwrecks to put inside! On Wednesday afternoon they chose the favourite tones and shades of blues and greens which they had colour mixed and, after looking at Dulux paint names, created their own names for theirs.

In English this week we have finished the story of 'Traction Man is Here', whilst also focusing on using commas in a list. In maths we have worked on problems solving using multiplication skills and in odd and even numbers.

On Wednesday morning we had a fascinating assembly with two marine biologists who told the children all about the creatures to be found along and off the coast of Norfolk. We also enjoyed reading an email from Miss Maibaum who is currently visiting the island of Cape Verde and shared some photos and tales of paddling with baby sharks.

The children have had guided reading each day and enjoyed another gymnastics lesson with Mr Palmer.







Year 3

What a fabulous half term we have all had in Year 3 - it has totally flown by!


In English, the children have been super busy writing their own explanation texts about the water cycle. At the beginning of the week, they each drafted a plan for their explanations. Their plans supported them to write their first draft. They then spent the latter part of the week making edits and producing a final draft. I must add how incredibly proud I am of the written work they have all produced this week.


In maths, we have continued solving multiplication and division questions. On a whole, they have shown secure knowledge and understanding across the week which I am very pleased about.

In science, we have completed another experiment. This week our experiment has looked at whether temperature affects the rate of evaporation. To test this, we placed three cups of water (containing 100ml each) in different locations around the school. After four days we then remeasured the amount of water in each cup to see which had evaporated most. Each child recorded the results on their own bar graph.

Finally, we exploded our volcanoes on Friday afternoon. We joined Year 4 to do this and it was SO MUCH FUN!

I just want to mention that it was great to meet you all at parent's evening and if you ever have any questions about anything please do ask!





Year 4

Wow, year 4! What a half term we've had. I know lots of you have been feeling super tired this week but have continued to work so hard!

We have started to explore equivalent fractions in Maths this week and you have been unstoppable in your determination to master them.

In English, we have completed our explanation unit and you finished you work on the water cycle.

However, the absolute highlight was erupting your homemade volcanoes this afternoon. I can still smell vinegar now! Thank you for your hard work on these and for family support too.











Year 5

We have had a lovely end to the term with the children being really focussed and working hard!

In maths, we have been looking at perimeter and how to work it out when you have missing lengths! A big well done goes out to Jake, as he quickly spotted the patterns and could explain these to the class! It is now known as 'Jake's Way!'



In English, we have moved onto instructional writing. Eventually, the children will write a set of instructions for how to turn their teacher into a toad! But for now, we have focussed on the features such as imperative verbs, prepositions and time conjunctions. We did this by writing instructions linked to making a cup of tea and a cheese & ham sandwich — which I then made in class following the children's instructions with some hilarious results!



In topic, we have finished our river models (as you can see from the picture) and we also began looking at the middle stages of a river. We did this through a piece of pointillism artwork. Here you can see meanders, tributaries, deposition and an oxbow lake!

Year 6

What a brilliant half term it has been! For part of this week, the children have completed a variety of test questions and it's amazing to see the progress they have made since last term.

In Maths lessons, the children have multiplied and divided decimals by 10, 100 and 1000 and have since moved onto a new topic of averages. This is where they've learnt how to calculate the mean, median, mode and range for a set of data.

In Literacy, the children have produced a fantastic biography linked to the life of Howard Carter and have learnt about the past and present perfect tense.

On Wednesday, to link to our whole-school topic, we were very lucky to have a visit from two Marine Biologists. In our KS2 assembly, we learnt about greenhouse gases, wind turbines and how to help protect the living things amongst our coastline.

In Science lessons, we continued learning about how light travels before researching the functions of parts of the eye. Recently, the children also learnt about refraction. On Thursday, the class used the Sphero devices for a computing lesson where they programmed their Sphero to create shapes and change colour.
