Bombers

Hi all, we have been super busy since returning from the Easter break. The children settled back happily and we can see many friendships emerging, which is always lovely to see. They have been busy developing their 'cutting' skills and engaging in a variety of collage and junk modelling.



We have looked at the letter 'li' with ice creams, insects and invitations. We also explored ice and arctic props to play with. As it was St George's day on Tuesday, we have had the Knights Castle small world out and some children made some flags. We have been doing lots of printing activities too and looking at healthy eating connecting and inset puzzles along with books.



The children have also enjoyed a daily yoga activity. Next week we are focusing on ring games and action rhymes and looking at letters in our names.

Reception

We've had great fun this week reading the classic tale The Enormous Turnip. The children have loved acting out the story and attempting to pull and heave the giant vegetable out from the ground! We have thought about how the different characters (including animals) might do it.

We are very excited, as we wanted to plant our own vegetables, tend to them and watch them grow so we have all planted potatoes. We'll keep you posted about their progress – the children have had to think about what they'll need to help them grow.

The children adored their dance lesson – we hope you liked seeing the video on Evidence Me! We have lots of 'Lion King' fans and loved dancing to that music.

In phonics, we have learned the 'oy' sound as in boy / joy. In maths, we have been investigating number bonds – these are pairs of numbers which total 10, such as 7 + 3 and 4 + 6, etc. Numicom is a great resource for exploring this.

Next week, we are looking forward to more of our 'Healthy Me!' topic when we will be exploring another quality text – this time not just about harvesting the veg but eating it too!

Year 1

This week in Year 1, we looked at the importance of eating a balanced diet as part of our Healthy Me topic. We planted some vegetables – peas, beans, potatoes and lettuces – so we can watch them grow and hopefully eat them before the end of term! We then designed our own healthy lunchboxes.

We recognised Earth Day on Monday by colouring in some animals that we would like to help to protect by looking after our planet.

On Tuesday, we were lucky enough to have a dance session with Miss Mackie from Premier Sports. She taught us a routine to 'Naughty' from Matilda. We were amazing!

In Maths, we have been counting in 2s, 10s and 5s and practising the 2 times tables. We sang lots of songs, and did lots of actions to help us remember. We are very good at this! We are very good at doubling on the interactive game, Hit the Button, if you would like to try at home.

In English, we started looking at the story 'The Bee Who Spoke' by Al MacCuish. We looked carefully at the picture of the central character's view from her Paris window and wrote a class list poem about it. We looked closely at Paris, and shared what we thought about the main character Belle. In Phonics we have practised the sounds o-e (phone home) and u-e (huge brute).

In Art we have been learning about Kente cloth woven patterns, which originate from Ghana. We worked with a partner to weave with paper. We also sketched our own patterns and learned about the colours used in Kente cloth and what they represent.







Year 2

This week in Year 2 the children have been learning about the importance of a balanced diet. They have learnt about the different food groups and the fact that no food is a bad food. We have talked about the importance of dairy foods for healthy strong bones and teeth and how we should eat a variety of different food every day including at least 5 portions of fruit and vegetables. The children designed a healthy packed lunch.

In art we have started a unit on textiles and weaving. This afternoon we looked at pictures of examples of brightly coloured Ghanaian kente cloth.

In English the children have read most of a lovely story called The Paper bag Princess. Their writing has focused on making predictions and composing sentences including appropriate adjectives, verbs and adverbs.

In maths the children have worked hard to secure their understanding of unit and non-unit fractions with Miss Knight.

On Wednesday we enjoyed a fabulous dance session with a visitor from Premier Sport.

Please, please try to hear your child read at least 3 times each week (just a few pages will do each time). This week less than 50% of the class had read 3 or more times at home. (Please also make sure your child has their record book at school on a Friday when we count reading stars). Have a good weekend.

Year 3

Well done, Year 3 - What a super, busy week we've had. That's your first ever school residential trip complete! We have had so much fun, completing a range of team building activities including camp cookery, canoeing, crate stacking, caving with low ropes and environmental based art. We also experienced a wonderful campfire with toasted marshmallows and popcorn alongside a ten-star talent show. Alongside so much more!

We can't wait to share more with you next week in our class assembly.

A huge thank you to Mr Ashman, Mrs Howes, Mrs Tunmore, Mrs Spurling, Mrs Penson and (most importantly) all the children for

Year 4

Year 5

What a great week in year 5!

In maths, we have continued our work on angles. This week we have been trying to find missing angles of triangles and quadrilaterals. Our key bit of knowledge was that triangle angles = 180 and quadrilateral angles = 360. We then had a go at drawing shapes with different angles... this was fun!!



In English, we have finished our shared writing about the clip of Alma and we are now moving on to using the skills that we have learnt to write our own suspense / mystery story. We will be typing these up so the children will be able to bring a copy home!

In science, we learnt about how our circulatory system works and how it delivers oxygen around the body. In geography, we looked at famous coastlines around the UK, such as Durdle Door, and talked about how they have been formed. In History, we looked at how the Ancient Egyptians managed to use the water from the Nile for their fields. We did this by making a Shaduf!



Year 6


The children have been absolutely amazing throughout their mock SATs tests and should be very proud of themselves. Even though I was impressed at their knowledge in all of the papers, I was particularly proud of how they approached a variety of Maths reasoning problems!


In English lessons this week, we learnt the importance of using dialogue effectively in narratives and how it can be used to 'move events forward'. This, along with using short sentences to create suspense, was put into another creative piece of writing.

In Maths lessons, we continued to convert units of measurements before learning about Roman Numerals. It was amazing to see how quickly they were able to pick this up! One of the tasks was to match up numbers to their equivalent Roman Numerals. This then created a triangle.

In Science, we continued to learn about the features of the heart and in Geography we located the countries within South America. On Thursday, the children had to see how many flags they could correctly identify from South American countries. Finally, the Year 6s had a great time coding their Spheros. The main challenge was to create a maze where the Spheros had to land exactly on each point before moving to the next. A lot of trial-and-error tactics

were used!
