### Reception

The children have absolutely loved our story this week, 'Supertato!' by Sue Hendra. They have joined in with lots of the repetitive phrases and really understood all the characters. We acted out the story and we were so pleased that lots of the usually quieter children wanted to take on acting/ speaking roles! It really reminded us how far all the children have come. Today, 'Evil Pea' from the story visited us – he was feeling pretty lonely but the children worked out it was because he was being so unkind and mean. They then came up with a plan to help Evil Pea be kinder and more helpful – they gave great advice!

The children have loved using the iPads connected to the 'sphero robots' – they had to sequence the Supertato story and code their robots to move to the different parts of the story. They showed huge interest in the equipment and great care towards it. They helped each other problem solve when needed and became quite expert at controlling the spheros after a few goes!

We have had lots of in maths with our sports theme, the children have been measuring how far they can throw a mini javelin (straws!), how far they can flick a cotton wool ball, bowling, and target throwing! It was fantastic to see the children predicting and estimating results, adding up their scores and working both individually and in teams!

We cannot quite believe it's our final week next week...it'll be a busy, fun and emotional one!







#### Year 1



In Year 1 this week, we had our final Design and Technology lesson. We designed, made and evaluated a picture for a children's book with a moving part. We chose to use either a slider, a lever or a wheel. We were very excited to show them to the Reception children to see if they appealed to a younger audience. They were very impressed!

We continued writing our own Jack and the Beanstalk books, using carefully chosen verbs and adjectives.

In Maths, we continued with our work on time by telling the time to the nearest hour (saying o'clock) or half an hour (saying half past). Some of us could even say 'quarter past' or 'quarter to'. We then looked at intervals of time and how many different things we can do in a minute.

We finished our Paris Pursuit and each received a certificate for running the length of the River Seine, jumping the height of the Eiffel Tower, and throwing around an Olympic stadium!



#### Year 2

We have had another busy week with lots of art activities which the children have really enjoyed. On Wednesday afternoon they made mushroom shapes from clay which they will paint next week. Yesterday we learnt a little more about Kenya and used atlases to find some information before creating fantastic masks based on either African warriors or animals.

In English the children have planned their own story based on The Secret Sky Garden and also written a letter to Miss Holding, telling her all about themselves and what they are looking forward to in Year 3. We also had a lesson learning the difference between we're, were, wear and where.

The children have been choosing favourite counting and times tables songs in maths and also solving puzzles and problems.

Today they have enjoyed wearing non-school uniform. This afternoon we had discussed personal space, privacy, safe touching and what to do or say if someone ever tries to touch us in a way that makes us feel uncomfortable. The children have also loved having Year 10 students in to help this week.



### Year 3

We have had a super penultimate week in Year 3!

In English, the children finished writing their adventure stories before writing a final draft ready for their class book which they will take up with them into Year 4. They wrote their adventure stories in first person, so to finish the week, they created some wonderful diary entries from their perspective of their adventure.

In Maths, the children have completed end of term assessments; I am really proud of them all for their hard work and determination which led them to produce brilliant results! On Friday, we took the opportunity to practise our target times tables ready for next year when the children will each complete a times table test.





In RE, the children have continued to look at the five pillars of Islam. This week the children focused their learning on the fifth pillar, known at Hajj. Hajj is a sacred pilgrimage that is required of every Muslim at least once in their lifetime.

In Science, we have been analysing and constructing our own food chains. The children have been identifying producers, consumers, prey and predators. They have also identified animals that are herbivores alongside those that are omnivores and those that are carnivores. In addition to this, we continued to complete daily observations of our boiled eggs in various liquids and discovered that the orange juice caused most damage to the egg's shell.

Finally, we have begun learning about electricity. Identifying mains and battery powered items and will continue to work on this topic next week.

Well done, Year 3 - I can't believe we only have one week to go!

### Year 4

This week our 'Digestion' topic has taken us to learning about food chains and animal teeth. We have been learning about the different components of a food chain and categorizing each part into producer, consumer, predator or prey (and also whether each is an omnivore, carnivore or herbivore).

In Maths we have been working on interpreting statistics and collecting data to turn into graphs and charts. On Thursday we had a fun lesson finding out about each other, whilst collecting data.

In English we have been continuing with our mythical creature non-chronological reports and finding the best way to present them on paper. There have been some super mythical creatures created!

Well done to all those children who have completed homework or made PowerPoints to show - they have been a joy to look at. Also, a big well done to those children who were fantastic tour guides for our TA interviewees on Thursday.

### Year 5

1 more week to go!

Maths this week, unfortunately for the children, has all been tests! They have not been happy... but have been amazing. Some children even doubling their scores from the Spring assessments. Fantastic work!

In English, we have continued our book study. We have used drama to show how a scene in the book would look on the stage... I was very impressed with Kayden's acting skills. We have also use relative clauses



to show what is going on in the story.

For our science, we held a competition to see who

could make a piece of paper travel the furthest but they were not allowed to screw it up into a ball! Sebastian realised that if he folded it up, it could be thrown across the entire playground.

Thursday was a highlight for us as we travelled to Broadland for a Science and Art Day. We used microscopes, used chromatography to foil a crime and even found out which food would be best for a long journey! The class were incredibly well behaved and really impressed all of the staff at Broadland.

### Year 6

We will soon be heading into the last week of Year 6! Where has the time gone? Earlier in the week, the children got to try on their costumes and use props for our rehearsals of the Keymaster. Although we haven't had many days with our whole class together, the Year 6s have been absolutely brilliant when rehearsing and they should be very proud of themselves!



One of our Maths activities linked to measuring accurately. The children were given instructions to follow – in order to design the Brazilian flag.

In Literacy, the children completed their balanced arguments of whether deforestation should occur in the Amazon Rainforest and I was impressed by the level of detail and consideration.



In D.T / Science, we continued to learn about air

resistance and nearly every group have completed their device to stop an egg from cracking when it's thrown off the pirate ship!

In Geography, the class learnt about biomes and climate zones and how they vary from country to country. They then had a challenge to research the biomes and climate zones for certain places.

Several children also had their Thorpe High and Hellesdon High transition days and the class had their final swimming lesson at Broadland where they got to play water polo!
